On Thursday 7th February 2019, over 170 members of the public affected by Crohn's Disease or Ulcerative Colitis attended a 'Crohn's and Colitis Open Evening' at the John Radcliffe Hospital, Oxford.

On arrival, delegates were welcomed by the wonderful teams attending from Crohn's and Colitis UK [CCUK-Oxford], OUH, NIHR Local Clinical Research Network [LCRN] and members of the Gastro Clinical Research Team, offering a unique opportunity to meet and greet alongside refreshments and a buffet.

The event was a great success and emphasised the need for continued research into the causes, treatments and monitoring of the conditions. The programme included five of Oxford's leading Gastroenterologist clinicians:

Professor Jack Satsangi discussed 'Personalising Care in Inflammatory Bowel Diseases;

Professor James East opened up the future prospects of 'Universal Consent'.
